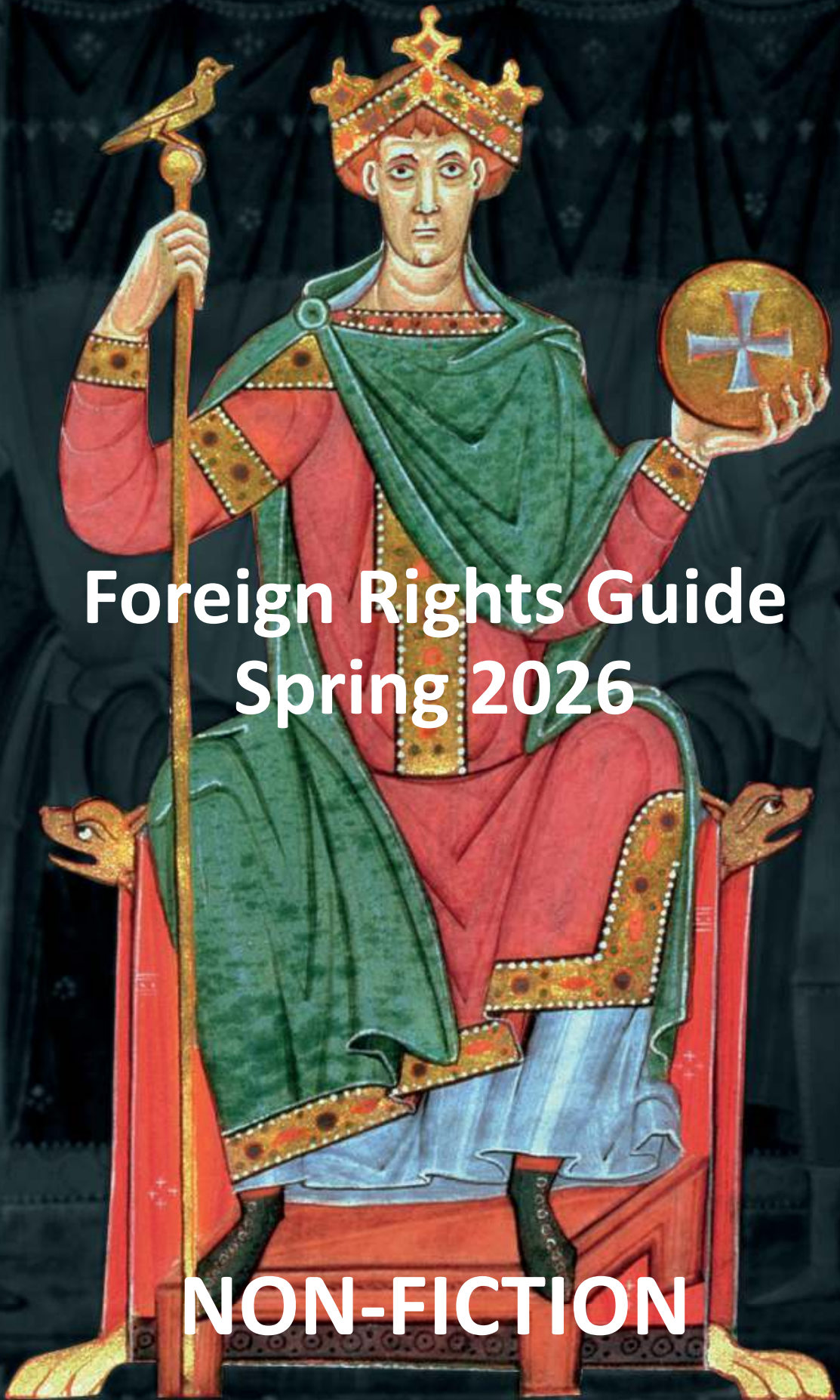

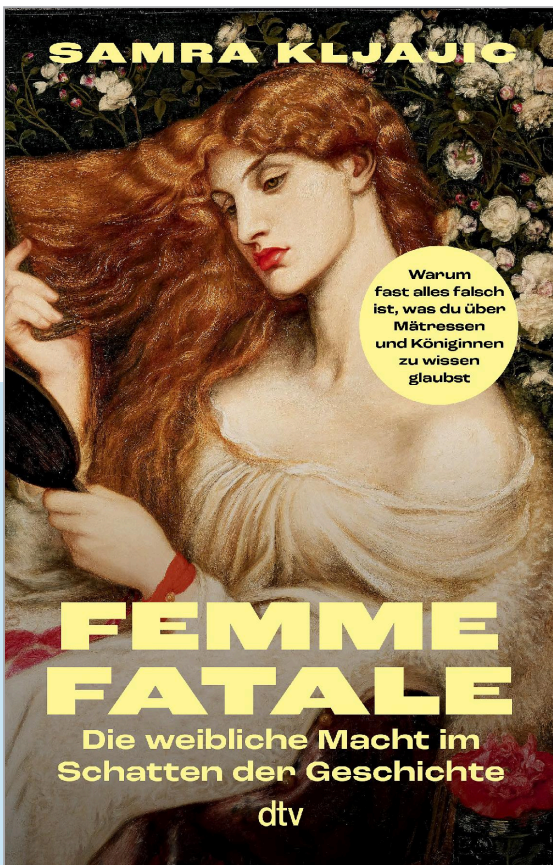

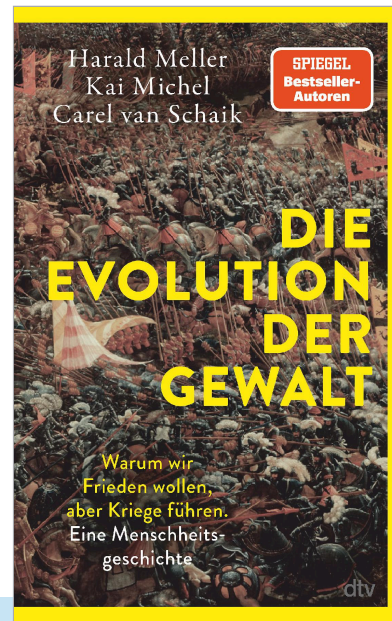

Syria, Ukraine, Gaza: Is international law in tatters? Does the law of the jungle hold sway?

With the Nuremberg Trials, a new chapter in the history of international law began after the Second World War. And after the Cold War, a rule-based world order appeared realistic. However, this is not the reality of the early 21st century – international law appears to be in ruins, brute force seems to prevail, and the global community seems to be settling into cynicism or resignation. Safferling's treatise is concise, competent, personal, and passionate. Despite its seemingly somber title, the book ultimately offers an optimistic outlook: Safferling argues convincingly that international law should not be written off as a regulatory framework for global relations. In the author's firm belief, it will ultimately assert its relevance and force. As readers move through the book, it becomes increasingly clear that there are compelling reasons to share this hope.

Why war is not fate

The unimaginable has occurred: War is back – and it is threatening us all. Was the long peace in Europe just a brief interlude? Are we doomed because we simply cannot counteract our warlike nature? It's high time to trace the evolutionary roots of violence. These three best-selling authors set off to tell a different kind of history of humanity. It pretends to be progressive, but ever since Hamas's attack on Israel, it has become increasingly anti-democratic: This is the new authoritarian left. Dogmatic and zealous, it re-interprets radical Islamic terrorist violence as decolonial resistance. It is quick to accept the propaganda and disinformation spread by autocratic regimes or dubious sources within 'alternative media'. Anybody with a dissenting opinion is rapidly labelled as the enemy, and its advocates fuel hatred of the press – sometimes even calling for murder. Drawing on investigative research as well as his own experiences, journalist Nicholas Potter offers an insight into the inner workings of the movement in Germany and the US and Great Britain, where similarly radical tendencies are emerging. Potter deftly lays out the network of the new authoritarian left, revealing how it operates, and asking: Are we, as a democratic society, ready for what's coming?

At some point it's just normal

He doesn't play, doesn't listen, doesn't talk and bangs his head against the wall whenever something upsets him. He pushes beans into his ears, refuses to use the toilet, drinks litres of Coke and coffee and eats cigarette butts. He avoids eye contact, but he does sometimes ask for a hug. Bastian lives in his own world. He is autistic. Unsensational and yet deeply moving, 'Bastian' is the story of Sascha Lehnartz's little brother. Lehnartz explains how Bastian became the pivotal point of his family's life (even as he pushed them to their limits). It testifies to how on the surface he held them together until his death, but inwardly was tearing them apart. An intelligent meditation on the demands life makes on us, and on what it means to be human.

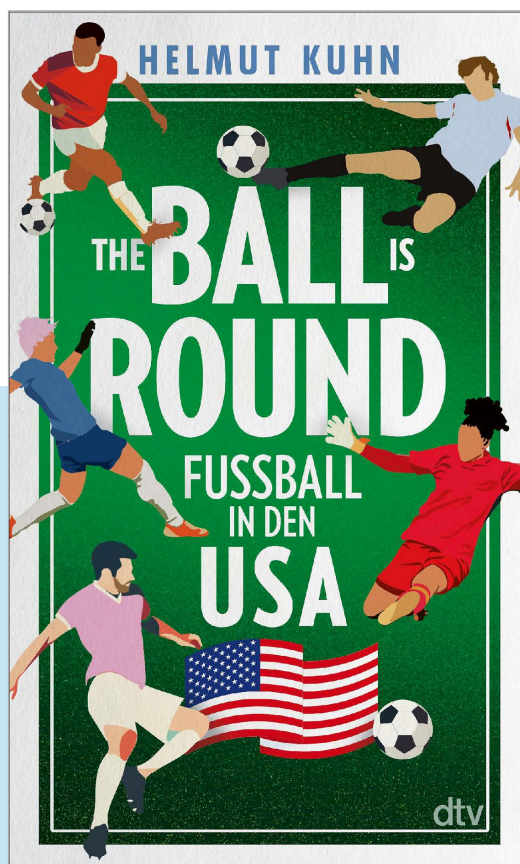

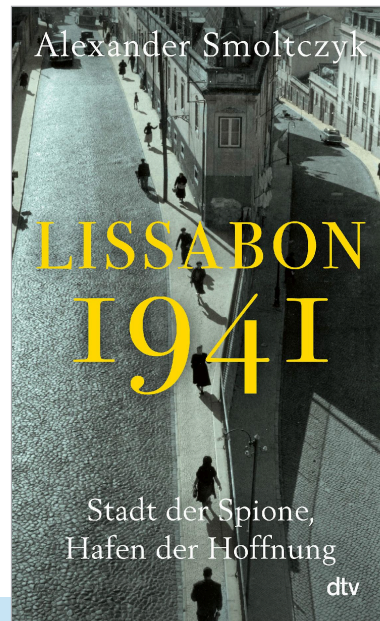
